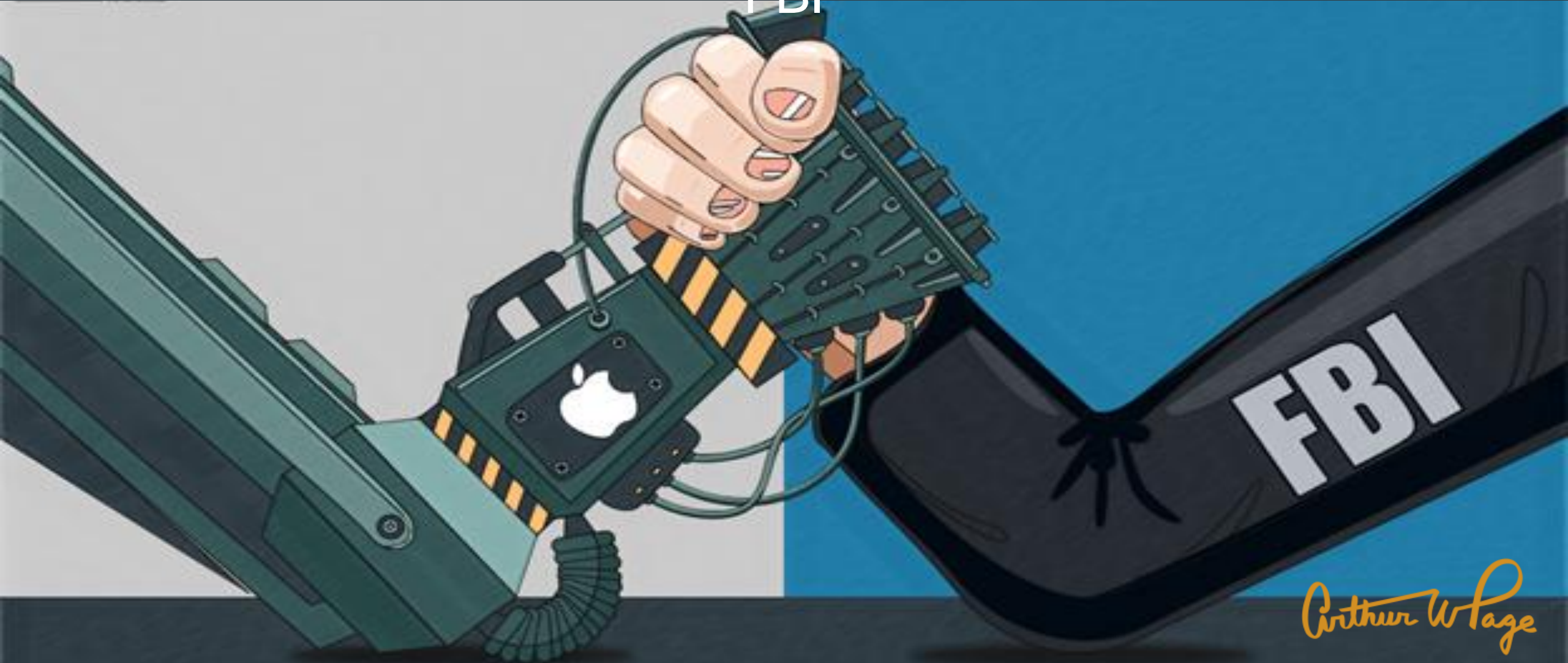

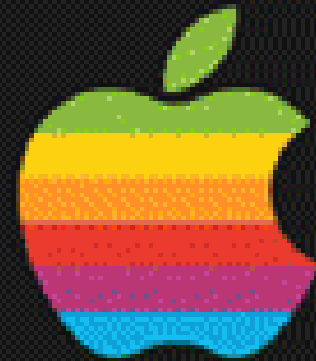

ARMS STOCKPILE IS FOUND IN HOME OF TWO SUSPECTS

F.B.I. Investigating California Rampage as a Potential Act of Terrorism

San Bernardino, Calif. — The single home of two suspects in the rampage that killed 14 people and wounded 22 others last December 2 was packed with thousands of rounds of ammunition and other weapons, officials said. The discovery, which they say began hours after the shooting, is helping the F.B.I. in tracing the individuals who bought the weapons and how they were transported to the home. The agency is also looking for other individuals who may have been involved in the attack.

The suspect residence, an 11,000-sq-ft home in San Bernardino, Calif., was searched by police on Dec. 22. It was found to contain thousands of rounds of ammunition, including 100,000 rounds of 5.56-millimeter rounds, 100,000 rounds of 7.62-millimeter rounds, and 100,000 rounds of 12-gauge shotgun shells. The home also contained several assault rifles, handguns, and other weapons.

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14 slain at California office party

San Bernardino, Calif. — A gunman killed 14 people and wounded 22 others at an office party for employees of a center for developmentally disabled people in San Bernardino, Calif., on Dec. 2. The victims included 10 men and 4 women.

The shooting occurred at the San Bernardino County Center for Developmentally Disabled People, a 100,000-sq-ft facility that provides services for people with intellectual disabilities. The party was held in a large conference room.

A Message to Our Customers

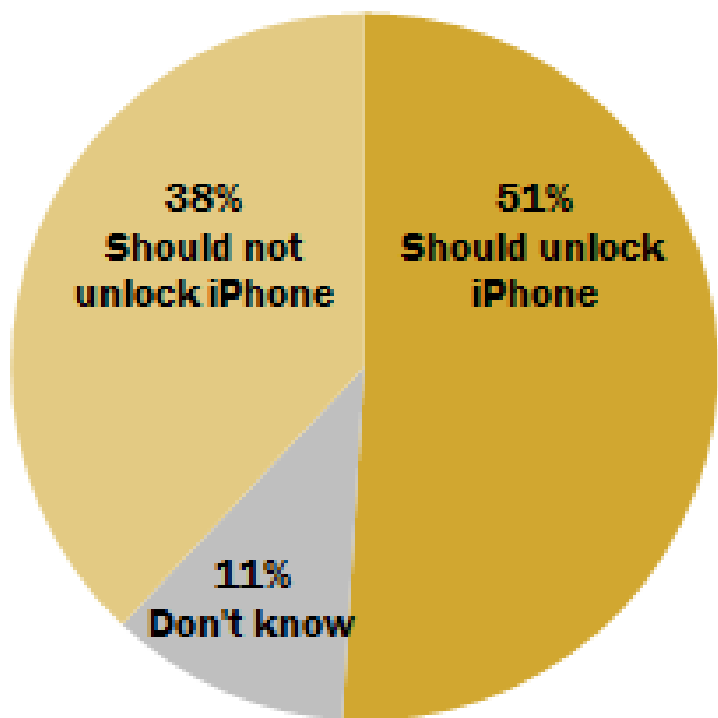
The United States government has demanded that Apple take an unprecedented step which threatens the security of our customers. We oppose this order, which has implications far beyond the legal case at hand.

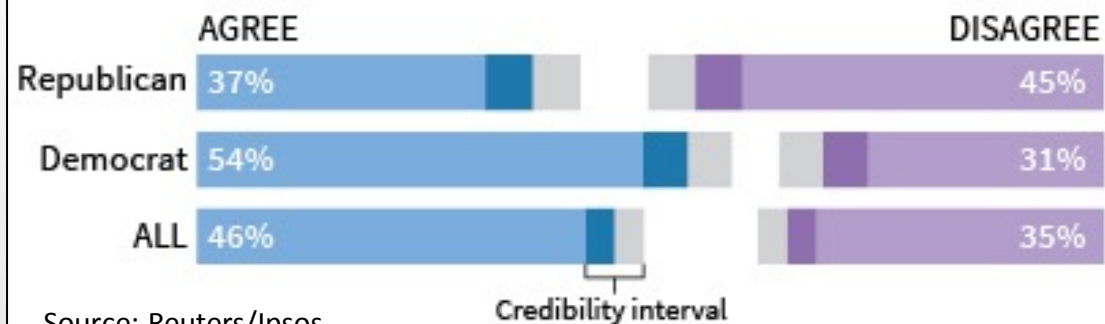
In response to court order tied to ongoing FBI investigation of San Bernardino attacks, Apple ...

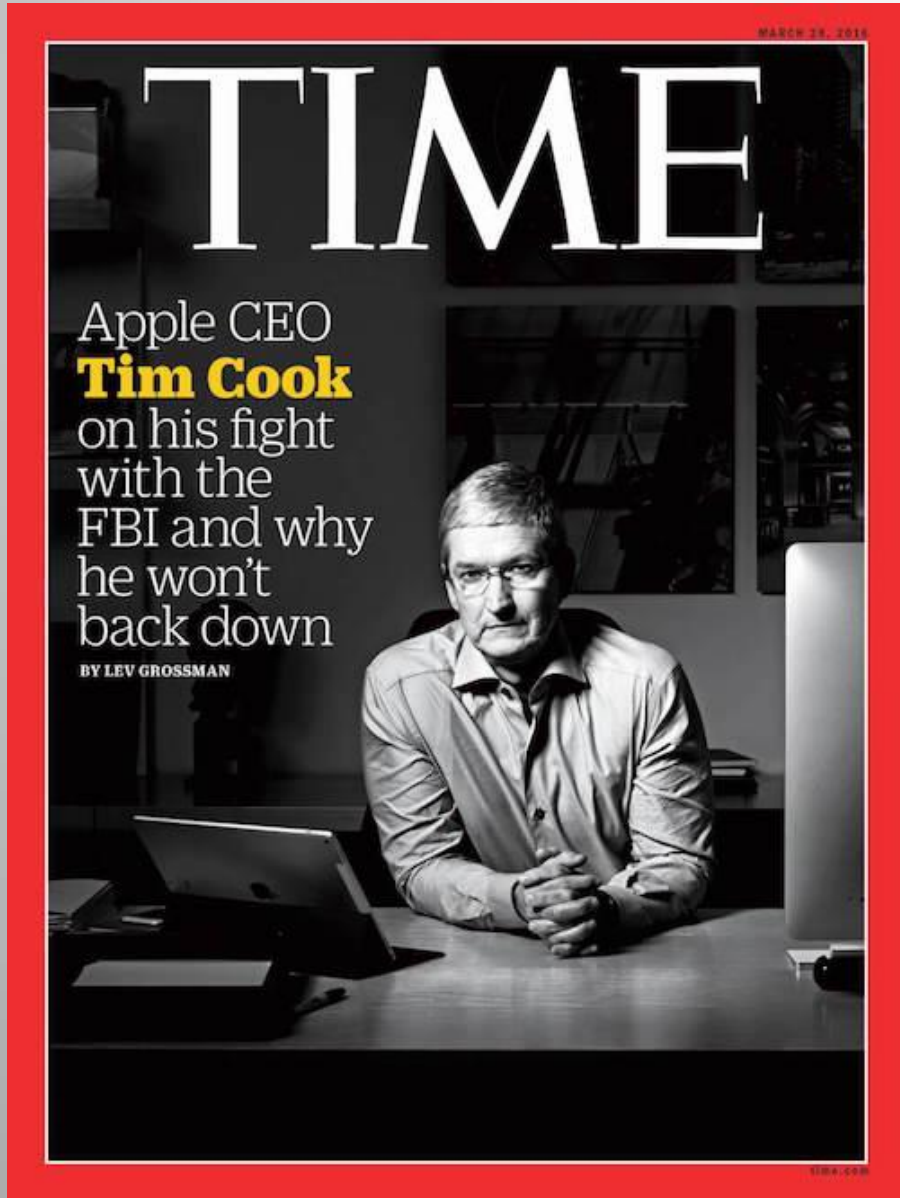
Do you agree or disagree with Apple's decision to oppose the court order to unlock a smartphone that was used by one of the shooters in the San Bernardino attack?
